In case you aren't already participating, the PRP consists of 3 VFR and 11 IFR flights, each with reading material regarding a certain skill, as well as a flight to be flown under ATC coverage to officially earn that rating. The PRP suits both novice and even real world pilots—some of the more advanced flights focus on skills such as correctly flying DME arcs as well as various non-precision approaches. Pilot Tip of the Month

Flying Without ATC

t is important to observe proper "uncontrolled" procedures at airports without ATC, even when those airports may be controlled continuously in real life. When flying into an airport without ATC, monitor and provide position updates on the server's UNICOM frequency (122.95). Communications should be brief and relevant, normally consisting of reports involving the runway (lining up, taking off, vacating) or your position (usually one position report somewhere on the approach or as you enter the airspace and one on final). Be careful not to over-communicate your position and intentions when using UNICOM. Communicating with UNICOM is particularly important when you're flying into busy airports when ATC is offline (for example, KBOS regularly, or KASE during our current Getaway event).

Additionally, be sure to check the airport's real-world METAR before you decide which runway to land on. Wind is reported based on the direction it is coming from; thus, pick a runway with sufficient length and with the number closest to that of the wind.

Finally, filing your flight plan (VFR or IFR) is still important when ATC is offline. This not only helps other pilots have an idea of who might be on and around the airport but also provides administrators with an idea of your intentions in case a server restart is planned (we try very hard not to reset the server while pilots are flying; filing your plan helps us estimate when the server can be reset). By filing your flight plan, you ensure others know where you are and that you won't have to quickly file if ATC comes online.
