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The New and Improved Cape Air Virtual

hree and a half years ago, when Cape Air Virtual ('CAV') was first launched, the original team of administrators had high aspirations for the airline's success. Today's Cape Air Virtual Administration is dedicated to honor those aspirations by continuing to ensure that the airline is operated under the same ideals with which it was created.

As many CAV pilots know, CAV has been in the process of restructuring the airline over the past few months. Cape Air Administrators have been working hard to ensure CAV is better and more realistic than ever! The improvements to Cape Air Virtual's operations are outlined in this article.

The first change for pilots is the rank structure. BVA's Pilot Ratings Program has been extremely successful since its release and CAV plans to take advantage of its offerings by requiring pilots to complete PRP flights in order to advance and maintain their rank within CAV. A detailed breakdown of pilot ranks and their respective training requirements can be found on the Cape Air Virtual website.

The second major change within the airline is the creation of Cape Air Elite, our upper-tier class of pilots. Cape Air Elite's creation was necessary because of the adjustment of the CAV fleet. Cape Air Elite pilots will be able to fly any of the turboprop aircraft on the 'Approved Aircraft' list available on our website. To fly for Cape Air

Elite, you must achieve the rank of Senior Captain. Pilots Senior Captain and above will be considered Cape Air Elite pilots and are welcome to fly Cape Air Elite routes and aircraft.

With Cape Air Elite's creation comes a large downsizing of the CAV subsidiary, Turbines Limited. While Turbines Ltd. will still exist, its role within the airline will be considerably smaller than in the past couple of years. One factor of the CAV Administration's decision to downsize Turbines Ltd. was the lack of an acceptable De Havilland Dash-8 aircraft for FSX. In the future if a suitable model should become available, the role of Turbines Ltd. within Cape Air Virtual may be revisited.

The last notable change for CAV is the condensation of our route structure. Routes for the Beechcraft Baron 58 and Cessna 414 will cease to exist and will be replaced with routes for the Cessna 402, the aircraft the real-world Cape Air flies. Although these routes are found in VAFS under the Cessna 402, pilots may fly them with any of the aircraft on the 'Approved Aircraft' list. Most routes will be available for all pilots; however some will be restricted to Cape Air Virtual Elite pilots, and a few to Turbines Ltd.

We invite all members of the BVA community to review our updated Regulations on our Cape Air Virtual website and see specific changes to the structure of Cape Air Virtual. Pilot Tip of the Month

Communicating on a CTAF

Ithough it is common to hear real-world pilots use the phrase "Traffic in the area, please advise" when approaching an untowered airport, it is actually incorrect to do so. The following is an excerpt from the FAA's Aeronautical Information Manual (AIM), Section 4-1-9:

"Self-announce is a procedure whereby pilots broadcast their position or intended flight activity or ground operation on the designated CTAF. This procedure is used primarily at airports which do not have an FSS on the airport. The self-announce procedure should also be used if a pilot is unable to communicate with the FSS on the designated CTAF. Pilots stating, "Traffic in the area, please advise" is not a recognized Self-Announce Position and/or Intention phrase and should not be used under any condition."

Instead of requesting others to advise you of their positions, it is your own responsibility to remain alert and listen for other traffic advisories on frequency as well as a maintain a visual lookout for those who may be flying in the pattern, but not communicating on the radio.

When entering the pattern at an untowered airport, simply state your position and intentions and then wait for others to respond. Normally, if other aircraft are in the vicinity, they will promptly respond to your initial traffic call and begin communicating their own positions and intentions. From there, you can begin coordinating as necessary with these aircraft to ensure a safe pattern entry and subsequent landing.
