KBGM (Binghamton) & KEWR (Newark)

Our controllers fully staff two airports and provide complete ATC coverage for flights between the two; pilots are encouraged to file preferred routes and can expect multiple handoffs and busy frequencies throughout the event

Pack the Pattern



Sunday, May 3 (2-4pm ET)

KEZM (Heart of Georgia)

Pilots are encouraged to fly into the event or fly IFR or VFR circuits of a busy Class Bravo airport, with full ATC coverage for the entire evening (including Clearance, Ground, multiple Tower and Approach controllers, and maybe even a Center!)

ZBW IFR Procedures Challenge

n Sunday, May 24, we'll feature one of the most difficult Challenge events hosted on our server. During the flight from KBED or KBOS over to KBDL, pilots will need to handle a re-route, hold, approach, missed approach, and finally a circling approach back to a full-stop landing. The event effectively covers almost all of the maneuvers that must be demonstrated on an IFR flight test.

During the event, ATC will be online for departures from either KBOS or KBED. On departure, pilots can expect to be assigned a

route to fly. Next, a hold will be assigned. After the hold, pilots will be vectored to KBDL for the ILS, missed approach, and circling approach procedures.

The Challenge page of our website provides detailed briefing material on each of the maneuvers expected during the flight. Additionally, IFR flights in BVA's Pilot Ratings Program cover everything pilots need to know to fly the event.

Start reviewing and preparing now, and we'll see you for the IFR Procedures Challenge at KBED, KBOS, and KBDL on Sunday, May 24 at 2-5pm ET.



New York Climb Procedures

hen flying from the "New York Three" (KEWR, KLGA, and KJFK), pilots can expect departure procedures that include climb procedures (e.g., Liberty Two at KEWR, LaGuardia Four, and Kennedy One). Although all aircraft may be assigned one Standard Instrument Departure (SID), climb procedures are used to route aircraft to different initial headings.

Let's use the LaGuardia Four departure as an example. It's important to look at both pages, as the description is included on Page 2. As you can see, departures from Runways 4, 22, and 31 are simply assigned headings; just like any other procedure. However, departures from Runway 13 can expect one of four climb procedures: Flushing, Whitestone, Coney, or Maspeth. Each contains specific heading instructions and are used in different circumstances.

A climb procedure will be assigned as part of the initial clearance, and re-stated in the takeoff clearance. When assigned a climb, read that back as part of the clearance. Then, review the SID to confirm you are able to accept and comply with the procedure. As always, if you aren't sure, just ask ATC for simplified instructions like a heading to fly after takeoff.
